BUFFALO FIELD CAMPAIGN COMMENTS ON SB 284 – DO NOT PASS

Mr. Chairman and members of the Senate Fish and Game committee,

On behalf of Buffalo Field Campaign I am submitting testimony on SB 284. Mr. Chairman, I request that my testimony be entered into the hearing record. Thank you.

Buffalo Field Campaign opposes SB 284 and the sponsor's attempt to cede state authority over wildlife to County Commissioner(s) control by requiring their approval before buffalo could be released or relocated in a county or counties in Montana.

SB 284 would also require County Commissioners to make certain findings that are arbitrary and capricious and designed to thwart a positive finding for transplanting or relocating buffalo in Montana.

SB 284 would remove authority for a state decision where all Montanan's have a represented interest to county commissioners who need not protect any Montanan's interest beyond the county line.

Wildlife in Montana belongs not to the state or any one person or interest group but to future generations who are the beneficiaries of the public trust.

Wildlife reintroduction is the responsibility of wildlife agencies entrusted with ensuring our wildlife heritage is protected and persists for future generations to enjoy and experience. County commissioners have no comparable authority to uphold the state of Montana's public trust responsibility.

The state of Montana is a trustee for our wildlife – this duty should not be diminished by the Montana Legislature to benefit one body or interest group.

The Montana Legislature has already imposed costly mandates on any attempt to reintroduce buffalo as a wildlife species in the state. As MCA 87-1-216 stands, the legislature mandates Montanan's pay for the costs of fencing, animal identification and health protocols, containment measures, and imposes property and safety liabilities on the state.

In addition, HB 194, which passed the House for consideration in the Senate, requires taxpayers to foot the bill for a forage analysis costing Montanans \$54,000 for every 100,000 acres under consideration or \$540,000 for a million acres. The fact that not one dollar has been appropriated for a forage analysis suggests the Montana Legislature never intends to authorize funding for another mandate it has imposed upon the people of Montana to reintroduce buffalo as wildlife. SB 284 adds to these legislatively mandated burdens by imposing another insurmountable hurdle for recognizing buffalo as wildlife in our expansive state: county commissioner approval.

In poll after poll, the majority of Montanan's have made it clear that we favor restoration of wild buffalo including 70% of 400 registered voters polled by Moore Information in 2011 and nearly eight in ten of 500 Montana voters polled by Tulchin Research in 2014 support restoring wild buffalo populations on public lands (76% support) and on tribal lands (78% support). By a vast majority, Montanan's favor (72% support) wild buffalo being managed like wildlife, not livestock.

SB 284 is not amendable. Thank you for taking action to prevent the erosion of Montanan's ability to recover and save our natural wildlife heritage by voting against SB 284.
